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FEEDING KITTENS

Ouick Fact: most cats are lactose intolerance so so avoid offering cheese or milk

Kittens require specialized, high-calorie diets to ensure proper growth.

Make sure you feed a kitten diet only, rather than an "all stages" or adult food.

An ideal diet for cats is high in protein and low in carbohydrates.

Diabetes, urinary tract infections (UTIs) and chronic gastrointestinal issues are less common in cats that are on a wet-food diet.

Cats are not avid drinkers. Multiple water bowls, wet-food and water fountains/faucet drips are good methods to ensure your kitty is getting enough water! Water should be kept in a separate place than their food.

Cats are carnivores - puzzles and feeding games provide relief of the predatory impulses, encourage exercise and improve overall happiness. To achieve this, you can try: hiding food, throwing treats across the floor or toys that dispense food/treats!
